Calderini, Aristide, born 18 October 1883 at Taranto, Italy, he was a professor of classical antiquities in the Università cattolica del Sacro Cuore, Milano. He died in 1968. *Chi è*, 1957; *DizBI*; LC; *WhoItaly*, 1958

Calero Secall, Maria Isabel, fl. 1975. She took a doctorate in Semitic linguistics. Certainly from 1992 to 1994 she was attached to the Facultad de Filosofía y Letras, Universidad de Málaga.

Caley, Earle Radcliffe, born 14 May 1900, he took a Ph.D. in 1928 at Ohio State University. From 1928 to 1942 he was a professor of chemistry at Princeton and afterwards joined his alma mater until retirement in 1960. *WhAm*, 8

Freiherr von Call zu Rosenberg und Kulmbach, Guido, born 6 September 1849 at Triest, he entered the Levant consular service at Tehran. From 1875 to 1894 he filled a variety of diplomatic posts in the Ottoman Empire. He was attached to development schemes of the Tauern railway as well as the port of Triest. He retired from public service in 1911 and moved in 1916 to Graz, where he died 12 May 1927. *DIBE*; *ÖBL*

Callahan, Raymond Aloysius, born 30 November 1938 at Trenton, N.J., he received a Ph.D. in 1967 from Harvard University for his thesis, *The reorganization of the East India Company's armies, 1784-1798*. Since 1967 he was a professor of history at the University of Delaware. His writings include *The East India Company and army reforms, 1783-1798* (1972). *ConAu* 69-72; *DrAS*, 1974-82

Callan, Hugh, born 19th cent., he wrote *Wanderings on wheel and on foot through Europe* (1887), *The story of Jerusalem* (1891), *From the Clyde to the Jordan; narrative of a bicycle journey* (1895), and *Heart cures* (1912). *BLC*

Callard, Keith Brendon, born in 1924, he wrote *The political forces in Pakistan, 1947-1959* (1959). Until his death in 1961 he had appointments at the Department of Political Science and the Institute of Islamic Studies in McGill University, Montreal. *LC*; *Macmillan dictionary of Canadian biography*

Callari, Roberto, born 20 August 1928 at el-Kef, Tunisia. After study in Tunisia, France, and Italy, he received a doctorate in 1954 at Paris. He taught briefly at the Università di Roma, before being appointed deputy secretary for the Middle East at the Italian embassy in Libya. He died at sea off Tripoli, 17 July 1966. *Oriente moderno* 46 (1966), p. 549

Callier, Camille Antoine, General, born 7 March 1804 at Saint-Omer (Pas-de-Calais), he was a graduate of the Polytechnique and l'École des ingénieurs géographes, Paris. In the service of the French government he roamed over Asia Minor and Greater Syria and subjected them to a critical topographical study. The French Foreign Ministry sent him to Egypt in 1839. He died in Paris on 12 January 1889. *DBF*; *Henze*

Calnard, Jean Marcel, born in 1931, he received a doctorate from the Université de Paris for his thesis, *Le culte de l'imam Hussein; étude sur la commémoration du drame de Kerbala dans l'Iran pré-safavide*, in 1975. He was a specialist of Islamic history of Iran, and attached to the CNRS, Paris. He was the editor of *Études safavides* (1993). *AnNEIFr*, 1995; *THESAM*, 4

Caloyanni, Mégalos A., born in 1869, he was a judge whose writings include *La Protection de l'enfance en Égypte* (Cairo, 1913), and *L'Organisation de la Cour permanente de justice et son avenir* (1932). *LC*

Calverley, Edwin Elliott, born 26 October 1882 at Philadelphia, Pa., he graduated from Princeton University in 1906 and took his M.A. in 1908. In 1909 he graduated from Princeton Theological Seminary, having been ordained the previous year in the Presbyterian Church in the United States. He was married to Eleanor Jane Taylor, M.D. From 1909 to 1930 they served as missionaries under the Reformed Church in America in Arabia and the Persian Gulf. During several furlough periods he pursued studies at the Kennedy School of Missions at the Hartford Seminary Foundation. In 1923 he received a Ph.D., *magna cum laude*, in Arabic and Islamic studies. After an illness in 1930 he became an instructor at the School of Missions and retired as professor of Arabic and Islamics in 1952. Throughout this period numerous honours, privileges and special opportunities came his way because of his recognized scholarship. His writings include *Worship in Islam; a translation with commentary and introduction, of al-Ghazzālī's Book of the Ihyā on the worship* (1925); originally presented as his thesis, Hartford, 1923. He also published *An Arabian primer* (1920), *An Arabian reader* (1925), *Islam; an introduction* (1958). For many years he was the editor of *The Moslem world*. He died in Hartford, Conn., on 21 Apr
